The Campaign

RM Partners North West and South West London Cancer Alliance has launched its new campaign – “Don’t Wipe Away the Hidden Signs” – to encourage people aged 50 to 74 to participate in bowel cancer screening.

Bowel cancer screening uses a test kit known as a faecal immunochemical test (FIT) kit. The test checks for blood in stool, which can be an early sign of bowel cancer or other conditions. The kit is sent to people who are registered with a GP in England, every two years.

The campaign will be seen across social media and heard across radio.

The bowel cancer screening awareness campaign will be live in January and February 2026.

Alongside encouraging people to complete their FIT test, we are also encouraging people to be aware of potential symptoms like blood in the stool and abdominal pain, and speak to their GP.

The key messages include:

- In England, over 43,000 people are diagnosed with bowel cancer each year, and it is the 4th most common cancer.
- Bowel cancer is cancer found anywhere in the large bowel, which includes the colon and rectum.
- It can affect anyone regardless of age, gender, ethnicity or where you live.
- The biggest preventable cause of bowel cancer in the UK is eating too little fibre.
- Knowing the symptoms are important, as the earlier bowel cancer is found the more treatable it's likely to be.
- Around 90% of people diagnosed with stage 1 cancer survive for 5 years or more, compared with around 10% of people who are diagnosed at stage 4.
- Having symptoms doesn't necessarily mean you have bowel cancer, but it's still important to find out what's causing them

What is bowel cancer?

Bowel cancer is cancer found anywhere in the large bowel, which includes the colon and rectum. It's one of the most common types of cancer in the UK.

Bowel cancer screening is a test used to detect bowel cancer, it uses a test called a faecal immunochemical test (FIT) to look for blood in a sample of your poo. This could be a sign of bowel cancer.

You collect the sample at home and return it by post to be tested.

It can help find cancer early, and before you have any symptoms, which may mean it's easier to treat.

What is Bowel Cancer Screening?

Bowel cancer screening is a test you do at home that checks for signs of bowel cancer. It's offered to everyone aged 50 to 74, who are automatically sent a kit every two years.

Bowel cancer screening uses a test called a faecal immunochemical test (FIT) to look for tiny amounts of blood in a sample of your poo. This could be a sign of bowel cancer. You collect the sample at home and send it by post to be tested.

It can help find cancer early, and before you have any symptoms, which can make it easier to treat.

How to get a bowel cancer screening home test (FIT kit)

If you're aged 50 to 74 and registered with a GP, you'll automatically get a bowel cancer screening home test kit (FIT kit) through the post every 2 years.

This is because your risk of getting bowel cancer gets higher as you get older.

If you're aged 75 or over, you can ask for a home test kit every 2 years by calling the bowel cancer screening helpline on:

If you do not have a permanent home address, you can ask your GP surgery for your bowel screening kit to be sent to the GP surgery or to another address.
